memberships and leases. We need to then make
\$70K. Fundraising was also significantly higher.
The Art Show increased their profit further
through the side products. The Art Show has
tapped into the generosity of those that visit the
area.

Sponsor: We only have one more year of \$12K
from Tradition Australia. Club needs to make
approx. \$70K to stay afloat.

Thank you to auditor, David McClelland, for a
speedy turn around.

David McClelland, Bishop Collins Audit P/L made
the following comments – it was a good solid year
of cash. Reducing debt to GCC and increasing
assets. Profit followed by a profit means that the
club is moving ahead. Congratulations on

Thanks to Nic Urie for his efforts again keeping on top of the maintenance of the club.



This year we have seen H&H Catering leave the club and would like to thank them for their support over the past years. 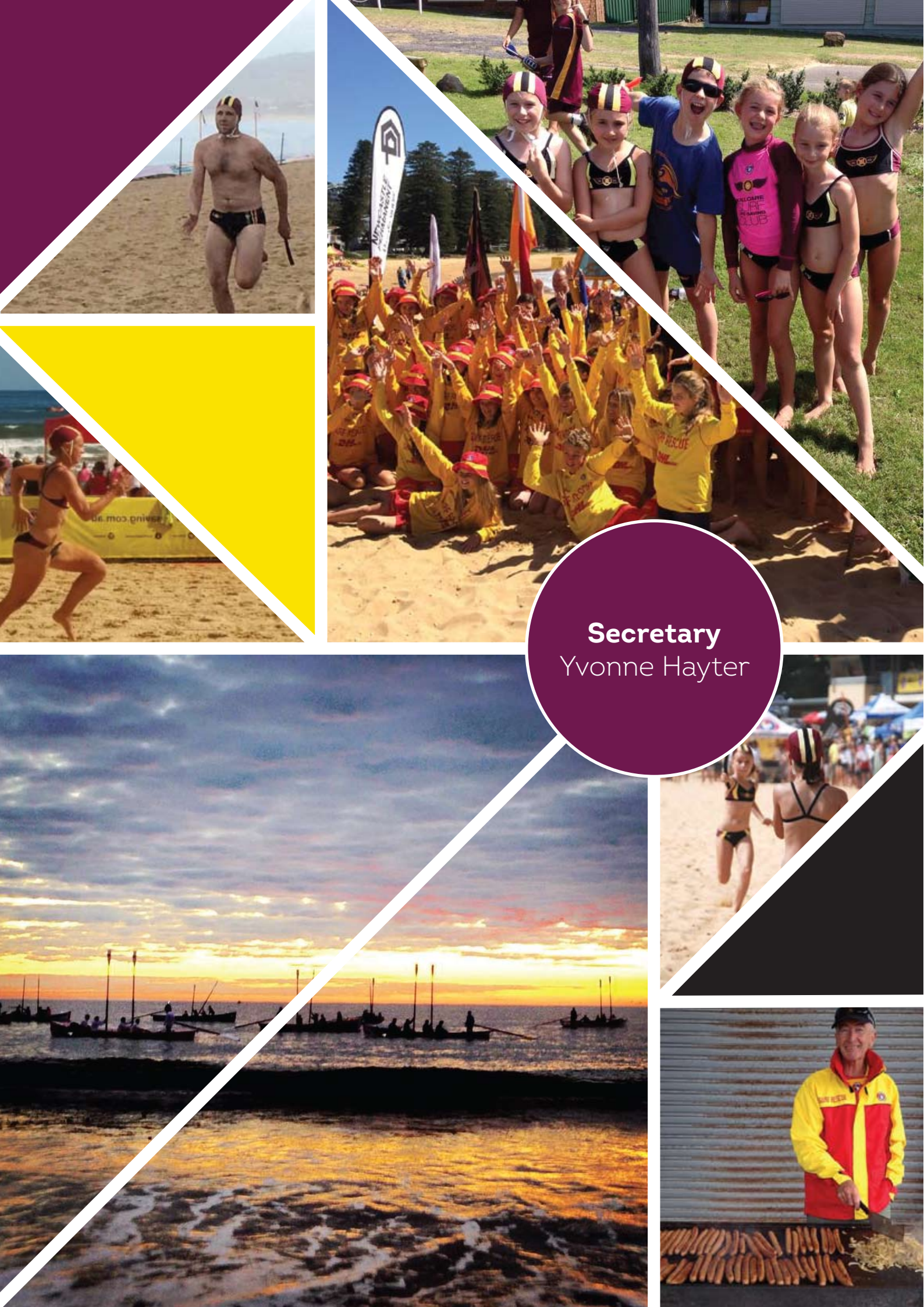

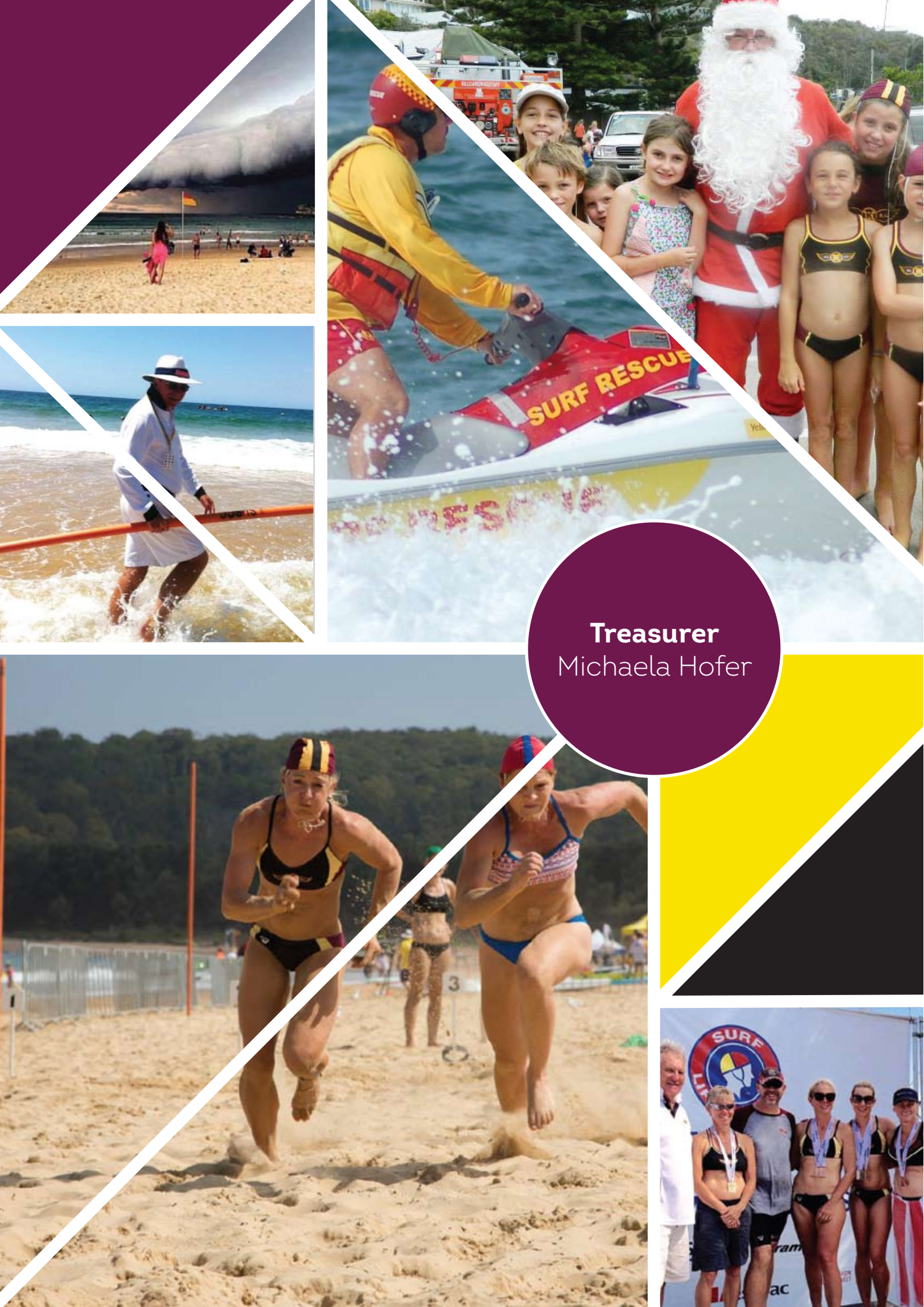
It's always a pleasure to be part of such a small but active club.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to report a profit for the year of \$25,580. This represents a decline from the pervious year of around \$13,653 (34.8%), down from \$39,233. Whilst this is lower than the previous year, it does represent another fantastic result, particularly as it is the third consecutive profit for the club. Having now had the three consecutive profits means the Club has set itself up well financially in preparation for some much needed building repair and maintenance work which is anticipated over the coming years. It also means that we can look forward to the next season without any reservations financially, and will be able to readily replenish any old, damaged and/or noncompliant equipment as the need arises.

The following provides a snapshot of the Club's profit and loss performance for the year, compared to previous years:

As indicated above, Revenue this year was down \$19,848 (9.1%) to \$199,010, with a few contributing factors being our slightly lower membership base (and membership fees), as well as lower rent received for the period (which was the result of the change in ownership of the two rental leases, detailed further below).

Once again we were able to achieve exceptional earnings from our Annual Art Show fundraiser, which generated a net income of approximately \$18,719, through a combination of Art Sales, Entry fees, Raffles and Donations etc. As the Club's major fundraiser, this figure is extremely pleasing and reflects not only the exceptional quality of the art for sale, but also the extremely generous community and friends that visit each year and support the show and Club. Special mention must be made to Craig and Megan Sheppard who were responsible for putting together the Art Show from scratch, and whose passion and commitment ensured it was a huge success for the Club.

The 2014/15 season saw the Club receive over \$21,973 in Grants from GCC, SLSCC, SLSNSW, and SLSA, which compares to \$15,466 received the previous year, an increase of 42%. We are extremely grateful for the on-going support from each of these providers, as it enabled the Club to acquire some much needed patrol and life saving equipment. We do recognise these Grants are not guaranteed each year, and as such, when planning budgets and expenditure for the upcoming season, we must remain mindful that the amount received next year (and following years) could vary considerably, possibly in the negative.

This past year, we were fortunate to secure new tenants in Barrie and Amanda Gibson, with their business A&B Catering. A&B Catering took over both the Café and Function Room leases from HnH Catering in October 2014, commencing new 3-year leases (with the option for 3 more). We are thrilled to have Barrie, Amanda and their team on board to support the Club through their operations, and look forward to working together, as we look at ways to encourage the local community to visit the Club and make use of the Club's facilities more often.

In 2014/15 we received the final sponsorship payment from TFS Australia. We have been extremely fortunate to have had the financial support from TFS Australia over the last 3 years, gifting the Club \$36,000 in total over the 3 years. Their contribution enabled the Club to introduce much needed (professional) training in surf skills (both swim and board) for both Junior and Senior members. Despite losing this sponsorship, we intend to continue offering the water based training and hope to continue seeing improvement in the skills set well into the future. It is important that the new Committee look to replace these lost Sponsorship funds through other means, be it through fundraising, grants or other.

Expenditures over all for the year were similar to the previous year, being only slightly lower. This was despite having to spend considerably more on Legal fees (approximately \$4,500) associated with negotiations with GCC surrounding the changing of tenants and lease documents. We would note these legal fees would have been considerably higher still, were it not for the enormous amount of work carried out by Linda Emery (& Associates) free of charge.

We also had to spend considerably more this past year on maintenance to the Clubhouse itself, including floor polishing, and new set of roller shutter doors for the gear room.

Of the acquisitions made during the year, it is worth noting the following major purchases:

From a Cash Flow perspective, the Club was able to reinvest around \$38,000 in cash over the year, taking our total Cash holdings to over \$115,000. This is in addition to our Term Deposit of around \$100,000, the purpose of which is to offset our loan with GCC. With regards to our loan with GCC, we continued to pay off \$1,000 per month throughout the year, and have a remainder of \$76,000 to be paid.

The increase in our Cash holdings in particular is extremely pleasing, as it provides the Club with additional financial security into the coming years. We witnessed heavy destruction to our foreshore (in front of the Clubhouse) as well as considerable damage inside the Café upstairs (to ceilings, floors, and equipment) during the heavy storms of April 2015. These storms, and the subsequent damage, served as a reminder that we are at the mercy of the elements, and need to remain financially secure to withstand such damage and potential interruption to our operations at any time.

It is worth noting that we operated the entire year without having to draw into our Building and Maintenance Fund (which we established the pervious season), such that the balance remains around \$41,000. Again, this serves to protect the future of the club as mentioned above.

Going forward, we are aware that we will need to reinvest back in the Club by way of maintenance and repairs, including (but not limited to) the following work: resurfacing of timber floors (approximately \$5,000), external painting of the building (estimated at \$16,500), replacement of the vinyl floors (approximately \$5,000), internal painting (approximately \$64,000) and the replacement of our security systems (around \$3,500). We are also looking at some much needed replenishing of some of the older gymnasium equipment in due course.

With the ongoing maintenance and repairs needed, we will need to look for new ways and opportunities to raise funds where possible - our local community, members and visitors will continue to play an important role through their generosity and support. We also remain hopeful for the continued financial support from GCC, our branch SLSCC, as well as SLSNSW and SLSA.

I would like to thank our President, Leah Fotofili, and my fellow Committee for their continued support this past year, as well as their dedication and commitment to the Club and the Club's successful future. I would also like to thank our book-keeper, Mireille Van Gent, for her ongoing support each month preparing our financials, and our Auditor, David McClelland of Bishops Collins.

I look forward to continuing my role as Finance Director, should I be voted in, and assisting the Club with its finances for another term.

Our deep appreciation also to Michaela Hofer who, as well as sharing her competition experience with all the groups on Sundays, offered beach training on Tuesday afternoons, and Angus Mackay who led the board training on Mondays.



Safety is always the first concern at Nippers and we adhere strictly to the ratios of water safety personnel in the water with the nippers every Sunday. Many patrolling members from the junior and senior ranks gave up their Sunday mornings to ensure Nippers could wade, swim & board in safety and we're most thankful to them and every Sunday morning patrol for making sure as many as 70 kids went through their water rotations safely and without incident.

In a new initiative this season, the Killcare Beach Kiosk offered a \$10 voucher to an outstanding nipper in a rotating age group every week. This was of course very well received and our thanks to Helena and Steve at the Kiosk for this great prize to add another incentive for the Nippers to give their all.

Killcare fielded teams in all 4 Central Coast carnivals this year as well as the State titles. Our medal tally (including team and individual events) was 10 Gold, 5 Silver and 11 Bronze with some terrific performances just outside the podium including 10 4th places, 8 5th's and 2 6th's, and too many personal bests to count. With entrants usually at about 800-1,000 for each carnival and Killcare being one of the smaller clubs, these are results to be truly proud of.

Particular mention must be made of the U/9's who were responsible for the bulk of these medals. Lilly Hofer, Grace Miotto, Lauren Sinclair and Lily Woods particularly excelled on the beach both individually and as an all-conquering relay team as did Ethan Barry, Harley Mackinnon, Joel Maddick and Jacob Ramirez. Lochlan Stevenson lived up to the family name, excelling in the swimming events.

Thanks to the parents who volunteered their time at carnivals. This will need to be addressed in the upcoming season.

It's my first year in the role of JAC, and to say it's a little more complex than I envisaged is a massive understatement! I've enjoyed it immensely and having largely fumbled my way through the season I look forward to a much smoother run for all involved next season should I be re-elected.

I'm greatly indebted to many people for their understanding and assistance this season; Yvonne Hayter did her very best to pass on her experience and knowledge after 5 years in the role and Steve Hayter's unparalleled experience on the beach - this season some of the kids he first took in the U/6's finish as Rookies - was always welcome; Justin Woods, Age Manager for the U/9's, was the driving force in our carnival participation; Sue Franz often seemed to appear almost magically when things were verging on overwhelming; the committee all provided fantastic support and advice to the program throughout the season; Mel Ives at SLSCC was always cheelfully helpful, and as mentioned, Michaela, Angus, the patrols and water safety and the incredible Age Managers..




Thanks for a great season, and I look forward to seeing you on the beach to start 2015/16.

As the water cools, now is a good time to consider some off-season training in the pool or, if you're really brave, joining the crew at Winter Swimmers!

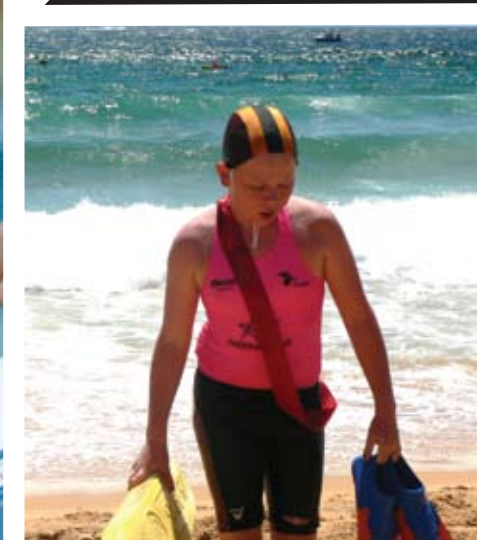

Most work this year has focused on upgrading and repairing building fittings and equipment to combat the corrosive impact of the salt environment.

Our new gear trailer, funded partly through the GCC Recreation Assistance Program has seen its first season on the beach. The new design constructed of durable aluminium and hot dipped galvanised iron incorporates a dedicated first area bay and storage areas for patrol equipment.

The front of our building has had a major face lift with 3 new double anodised aluminium roller shutters replacing the rusted powder coated doors fitted to the original building 6 years ago. The majority of this cost was paid for by the club whilst GCC financed the installation. If washed down regularly these doors should last much longer.

Also the front lawn received a make over prior to the start of the season. With a small army of volunteers providing the grunt, generous support from GCC donating the soil and turf and State Rail supplying a mountain of rail sleepers, we were able to transform the area in one busy morning. Special thanks also to Adam McCall for the initial excavation and Victor Rameriz providing the machinery and expertise to cut many of the sleepers.

The April storm inflicted considerable damage to the club – shredding blinds in the restaurant, damaging veranda ceilings, smashing one of our new shark alarm speakers and the TV aerial and ripping display cabinets off the wall. Much of the beach and some of the fore dune was removed as well as undermining and collapsing part of the café lawn.

Whilst this has created excellent sand banks for surfing it should remind us that without substantial vegetation, the dunes can be easily washed away during the East Coast Low storms threatening the surf club and the beach that we all love.

Recent pointless vandalism of 2 mature banksia at the north end of the carpark will only make it easier for wave action during storms to create further destruction.

Notes to the financial statements
30 April 2015

Note 1. General information

The financial statements cover Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Inc as an individual entity. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Inc's functional and presentation currency.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 8 August 2015.

Note 2. Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The incorporated association has adopted all of the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

In the executive members' opinion, the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purposes of complying with the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and associated regulations. The executive members have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the board of management of Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Inc.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1031 'Materiality', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for, where applicable, the revaluation of available-for-sale financial assets, financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, investment properties, certain classes of property, plant and equipment and derivative financial instruments.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 3.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the incorporated association and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Sale of goods

Sale of goods revenue is recognised at the point of sale, which is where the customer has taken delivery of the goods, the risks and rewards are transferred to the customer and there is a valid sales contract. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of sales returns and trade discounts.

Grants and Donations

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

Membership fees

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recognised at the time of receipt.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

As the incorporated association is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification .

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as noncurrent.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectable are written off by reducing the carrying amount directly. A provision for impairment of trade receivables is raised when there is objective evidence that the incorporated association will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables. Significant financial difficulties of the debtor, probability that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation and default or delinquency in payments (more than 60 days overdue) are considered indicators that the trade receivable may be impaired. The amount of the impairment allowance is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. Cash flows relating to short-term receivables are not discounted if the effect of discounting is immaterial.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

Inventories

Stock on hand is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises of purchase and delivery costs, net of rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Financial assets

Financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. They are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on the purpose of the acquisition and subsequent reclassification to other categories is restricted.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the incorporated association has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership

Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments includes non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities where the incorporated association has the positive intention and ability to hold the financial asset to maturity.

This category excludes financial assets that are held for an undefined period. Held-to-maturity investments are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method adjusted for any principal repayments. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired.

Impairment of financial assets

The incorporated association assesses at the end of each reporting period whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired. Objective evidence includes significant financial difficulty of the issuer or obligor; a breach of contract such as default or delinquency in payments; the lender granting to a borrower concessions due to economic or legal reasons that the lender would not otherwise do; it becomes probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset; or observable data indicating that there is a measurable decrease in estimated future cash flows.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the incorporated association. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Where there is an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date, the loans or borrowings are classified as non-current.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the incorporated association for the annual reporting period ended 30 April 2015. The incorporated association has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually

evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Unsecured loan - Gosford City Council

Killcare Surf Life Saving Club Inc has a loan agreement for an \$120,000 unsecured interest free 10 year loan from Gosford City Council. As at 30 April 2015, \$76,000 remains outstanding and the remaining term of the repayments is 6 years.

Lease agreement over land

Killcare Surf Life Saving Club has been in operation for the past 78 years and has been built on crown land.

Deed of license and lease of the restaurant and bar to A& B Catering

This requires a bank guarantee which has been received. At the date of this report, the amount owing by A&B catering to Killcare Surf Life Saving Club is \$4,469.
